TALLMADGE BOND ISSUE FINANCIAL UPDATE



In November, residents passed two bond issues for the Tallmadge City School District. The district is now in the process of securing and selling bonds to pay for the new academic and athletic facilities.

The first step was to sell short-term notes in order to have monies immediately available to allow the district to enter into necessary contracts. In December, the district sold notes worth \$9.9 million at a 1.35% interest rate. The district sold an additional \$21.1 million in notes on Jan. 18 at a 1.328% interest rate. In both cases, the district received very attractive and competitive interest rates.

The next step in the process is to prepare the official statement and adopt the resolutions that bond council requires, keeping the district accountable to taxpayers. The district will likely sell the bonds in late March or early April, and is currently selecting an underwriter to help facilitate the bond sale process.

The bonds will be sold on a level debt structure to keep the millage constant throughout the life of the bonds. The building bond issue was approved as a 37 year term and the athletic facilities is a 35 year term.

We are grateful to our taxpayers for their support and will remain accountable and transparent throughout this process. Again, we thank them for voting in November and are excited about the new facilities and the future of Tallmadge City Schools.

I am pleased to announce the Tallmadge City School District has officially selected Sol Harris Day Architecture out of North Canton as the firm to begin work on the academic portion of the district's building initiatives.

In November, the community passed two bond issues. The first was to consolidate the primary, elementary and middle schools into two buildings on the current middle school campus, a K-5 building and a 6-8 building. The second was to relocate all athletic facilities to the high school campus. Sol Harris Day will be working on the elementary



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and middle school buildings.

We received proposals from 12 highly qualified architecture firms. Sol Harris Day really separated themselves when it came to their ideas on designing buildings focused on 21st century learning. They also presented a detailed plan on involving students, staff, teachers, parents and the community in the design phase. These areas were of high importance for the district as these buildings need to last for decades to come.

Now that the architect is in place, the district can begin the process of hiring a construction manager. Six have applied so far. Sol Harris Day will also be involved in this process.

Additionally, the design and engineering phase will also begin.

As we begin the design process, we will be inviting community members, along with teachers, students and parents to join us. Tallmadge residents have been involved from the beginning of this facilities project and we want to give them the opportunity to weigh in on the design of the finished project.

In addition to the elementary and middle school project, the district is in the process of selecting an architect for the athletic facilities. The goal is to coordinate both projects so they run simultaneously. Even though they are separate projects, they are interconnected as we have to coordinate moving the high school athletic facilities while the construction of the new buildings take place.

I look forward to beginning this next phase of the construction process and continue progress on our new facilities.

TALLMADGE MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN GENIUS HOUR, LAUNCH TALLMADGE THINK TANK

Tallmadge Middle School officially launched Tallmadge Think Tank (TTT), an opportunity for students to utilize one hour of Academy time to explore an area of personal interest over the first semester in the 2016-2017 school year.

"Teachers who empower students to explore their own passions can meet learning goals while creating powerful experiences that lead to increased motivation and critical thinking," said Principal Robert Kearns. "With this philosophy in mind, we created TTT."

Last year, middle school staff toured the STEM school in Akron and noticed how engaged they were in project-based learning. Wanting to foster that atmosphere at Tallmadge Middle School, the staff members returned and began conceptualizing TTT.

Early last year, students in all grades were surveyed about their interests and passions. This data was used to group students and to place them with a "Project Mentor," who guided students to explore their area of interest through a problem-based learning model.

At the end of the survey process, almost 30

groups were created focusing on interests from volleyball to music to robotics. Every Thursday for nine weeks, the groups met for an hour to learn more about their areas of interest. Their final project could culminate in a performance, video presentation or a tangible artifact such as a homemade dress or a photo. On Tuesday, December 20, the groups presented their final projects.

"We're really hoping to get kids to learn problem solving and critical thinking through these

projects, getting them to think in terms of where they are, where they want to be and how to get there," Kearns said. "When kids explore something they're passionate about, they put more effort in and learn more from the process."

Tallmadge has implemented a Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support (PBIS) program at Dunbar Primary and Munroe Elementary

Schools. PBIS includes preventative and responsive approaches that may be effectively implemented with all students in a classroom and intensified to support small groups or a few individual students.

Classroom PBIS strategies are important tools to decrease disruptions, increase instructional time, and improve student social behavior and academic outcomes, which is critical as schools are held to greater accountability for student outcomes and teacher effectiveness.

At Tallmadge, students are given a behavioral matrix illustrating how to behave in different settings, including in the hallways, cafeteria, playground and on the bus. Students are instructed to be safe, respectful, responsible and engaged. The matrix and PBIS help to establish behavior expectations for students and a process for addressing behavioral concerns.

Tallmadge City Schools are dedicated to providing our students with a high-quality educational setting. By implementing PBIS, we are better able to ensure that classrooms and learning environments are safe, focused and stimulating.
